- Expanded membership with several new HOA members to include Hawthorne's Grant, Rugby Hall and Severn View
- Joined Alliance for Livable Communities to focus on Smart Growth in the County
- Closely monitored proposed and continuing development in the Arnold area, including the Hagan property, East Joyce Lane, Property 1481, Arnold Overlook, EZ Storage, Admiral's Ridge, the new Arnold Elementary School, Enclave at Shore Acres, Sprigg's Farm, Village at Stephen's Woods, 35 Old Frederick Road, 977 Ritchie Highway, Antioch Church and Wroxeter Estates
- Sponsored Century Ride Rest Stop for fourth year at Arnold Station
- Participated in May and October Bike to School Days AND sponsored bike safety vets.
- Partnered with other local groups to advocate for transportation improvements, including the Severn River and Bay Bridges
- Developed strategy for ensuring Arnold was in the forefront of and had input in Plan 2040
- Hosted three weekend clean-ups on Route 2
- Worked with the newly formed Peninsula Coalition to bring attention to the specialized needs of living on a peninsula

## **APC 2018 Challenges**

- Monitor Comprehensive Rezoning applications
- Continue to develop strategies for ensuring Arnold is in the forefront of and has input in Plan 2040: the updating of the General Development Plan
- Prepare and administer resident survey in connection with General Development Plan
- Educate constituents on 2018 County Executive and County Council elections
- Continue to advocate for multi-modal transportation options
- Increase awareness of infrastructure backlog and advocate for adequate funding to match development
- Monitor policy for pending solar panel permits and regulations
- Advocate for increased water access through public/private partnerships
- Work towards all adequate public facilities being required for all development – example is Cape St Claire has 220 buildable lots, that will affect traffic, sewer, schools etc. on Broadneck Peninsula. Currently developments of 5 lots or less exclude improvements to schools and roads.
